Gaming Representative 1

Definition

In a training capacity, observes and monitors the operations and procedures of excursion gambling boats, racetrack enclosures, or pari-mutuel facilities to ensure compliance with the Code of Iowa and Iowa Administrative Rules and the licensee's internal controls and game rules; performs related work as required.

The work examples and competencies listed below are for illustrative purposes only and not intended to be the primary basis for position classification decisions.

Work Examples

Learns to interpret and enforce the Code of Iowa and Iowa Administrative Rules for excursion gambling boats, racetrack enclosures or pari-mutuel racing; makes recommendations on matters not specifically covered by the rules or code.

Review the calculations, verification procedures, and reported revenue of randomly-selected weekly gaming reports; notifies the operator of any inconsistencies discovered; resolves differences; and prepares an audit report of the findings.

Learns operation of slot machines, video games of chance, and various casino games such as craps, blackjack, roulette, and other dice and card games.

Learns to interview applicants for licensing if the initial application contains information that may be disqualifying; clarifies the information and makes a decision on the ability of the applicant to be licensed.

Advises the licensees, law enforcement officers, and patrons on the proper conduct of pari-mutuel racing or casino gaming; resolves regulatory disputes; advises the licensee of potential compliance problems with proposed changes in internal controls, rules of the games, or proposed new games; approves internal controls and rules of the games.

Serve as an alternate member of the quasi-judicial gaming board: review incident reports alleging various violations. Conduct hearing, receive testimony and evidence, and issue rulings and penalties. Makes recommendations to the Racing and Gaming Commission for further action.

May observe the running of live races and replays on videotape to determine if all gates opened simultaneously and the lure operated properly; calls order of finish using photos as necessary; may disqualify and change the order of finish if a foul was committed; declares race official or no race; may order greyhounds to schooling list as required.

Conducts periodic and random reviews of the various aspects of the excursion gambling boat, racetrack enclosure or pari-mutuel operation to ensure compliance with the lowa Code, lowa Administrative Rules, internal controls, and game rules. Advises the licensee of alleged violations, changes needed, and problem resolution.

Competencies Required

Knowledge:

• Law and Government – Laws, legal codes, court procedures, precedents, government regulations, executive orders, agency rules, and the democratic political process.

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- Economics and Accounting Economic and accounting principles and practices, the financial markets, banking and the analysis and reporting of financial data.
- English Language The structure and content of the English language, including the meaning and spelling of words, rules of composition, and grammar.
- Basic Arithmetic Addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

Abilities:

- Law and Government Understand and adhere to applicable laws, legal codes, administrative rules, and regulations.
- Oral Comprehension Listen to and understand information and ideas presented through spoken words and sentences.
- Oral Expression Communicate information and ideas in speaking so others will understand.
- Near Vision See details at close range (within a few feet of the observer).
- Documenting/Recording Information Entering, transcribing, recording, storing, or maintaining information in written or electronic/magnetic form.
- Deductive Reasoning Apply general rules to specific problems to produce answers that make sense.
- Inductive Reasoning Combine pieces of information to form general rules or conclusions.

Skills:

- Evaluating Information to Determine Compliance with Standards Using relevant information and individual judgment to determine whether events or processes comply with laws, regulations, or standards.
- Active Listening Giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand
 the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate
 times.
- Critical Thinking Using logic and reasoning to identify the strengths and weaknesses of alternative solutions, conclusions or approaches to problems.
- Negotiation Bringing others together and trying to reconcile differences.
- Judgment and Decision Making Considering the relative costs and benefits of potential actions to choose the most appropriate one.
- Service Orientation Actively looking for ways to help people.
- Complex Problem Solving Identifying complex problems and reviewing related information to develop and evaluate options and implement solutions.

Minimum Qualification Requirements

Applicants must meet at least one of the following minimum requirements to qualify for positions in this job classification:

- 1) Graduation from an accredited college or university with an associate's degree in accounting, public or business administration, compliance, finance, law, or a closely-related field.
- 2) Two years of full-time work experience in the compliance with or interpretation of administrative rules, laws, or regulations.
- 3) Two years of full-time work experience in the pari-mutuel racing or gaming industry in a position that involved interpreting rules, compliance, and making judgments.
- 4) A total of two years of education and/or full-time experience (as described in number two or three), where thirty semester hours of accredited college or university course work in accounting, public or business administration, compliance, finance, law, or a closely-related field equals one year of full-time experience.

Notes

Positions in this class require the ability to pass a background check to obtain licensure by the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission. Licensure is necessary for permanent employment.

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
